

Presentation of Credentials

Since our first edition introducing our new Australian High Commissioner, Sonya Koppe has visited several countries in the region to present her letters of credence and introduction.

In March, Ms Koppe presented credentials to the former President of Trinidad and Tobago, HE Paula-Mae Weekes ORTT, followed by visits in May to present credentials to the President of Suriname, HE Chandrikapersad Santokhi, and the President of Guyana, HE Dr Mohamed Irfaan Ali.

In September, High Commissioner Koppe presented her letters of introduction to Jamaican Prime Minister, the Most Hon Andrew Holness, ON, PC, MP before travelling to Belize to participate in Diplomatic Week, where Ms Koppe presented to Belizean Foreign Minister, the Hon Eamon Courtenay.

Also in September, she presented letters of introduction to Prime Minister of Antigua and Barbuda, the Hon Gaston Browne, and in early October Ms Koppe presented credentials to President of Barbados, HE Dame Sandra Mason, FB, GCMG, DA, SC, LLD.

The Australian High Commission in Port of Spain is accredited to 14 countries in the region and Ms Koppe is keenly looking forward to visiting and presenting credentials in the countries she has not yet been to.

I was particularly pleased to visit aid projects funded by the Australian Government under our Direct Aid Program in Guyana, Jamaica and Belize. It was a fabulous opportunity to see Australian aid at work and the difference our small grants are making to local communities. These visits also enabled me to travel into the countryside – into the interior of Guyana and Jamaica and down to southern Belize.

I'm looking forward to visiting our other countries of accreditation in the near future. Meanwhile, I hope you enjoy reading about other activities the Australian High Commission has been involved in over the last few months.

JAMAICA

In the lead up to the 2023 FIFA Women's World Cup, the competition's prestigious trophy made its journey to each of the 32 qualified countries, including Jamaica and Haiti. The 2023 tournament was the first to be co-hosted – between Australia and New Zealand – the first to be held in the southern hemisphere, and the first with 32 teams.

At the invitation of the Jamaica Football Federation (JFF), Acting High Commissioner Ms Melissa Mitchell spoke at the trophy tour launch event in Kingston, highlighting Australia's commitment to harnessing the power of sport to promote gender equality, as well as the strength of sporting ties between the Caribbean and Australia.

GENDER EQUALITY SYMPOSIUM

In the sidelines of the FIFA Women's World Cup, Australia's Minister for Foreign Affairs, Senator the Hon Penny Wong, hosted a Gender Equality Symposium, bringing together women leaders, human rights advocates, athletes and academics, including Jamaica's Foreign Minister, Senator the Hon Kamina Johnson Smith. The Symposium reflected the Australian Government's commitment to inspire action and connection on gender equality and the human rights of women and girls through the power of sport and featured addresses by former international footballers Khalida Popal (former Afghan Women's captain), Sarah Walsh and former Australian national team players as well as FIFA Chief Women's Football Officer, Sarai Bareman.

Speaking to attendees, Minister Wong reflected on the benefit to communities when women and girls are supported to engage and our responsibility to champion that inclusion: "this FIFA Women's World Cup reminds us how we come together as an international community and as a human community. Sport — especially the global game of football, played by millions, watched by millions — brings us together in all our beautiful diversity. A kaleidoscope of humanity."

NAIDOC Week

Marked in the first week of July each year, NAIDOC Week is a celebration of the history, culture and achievements of Australian Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Peoples. This year's theme recognised the important and prominent role Elders have played, and continue to play, in First Nations communities and families. First Nations communities draw strength from their knowledge and experience, in everything from land management and cultural knowledge to justice and human rights. Elders influence multiple sectors like health, education, the arts, politics and everything in between.

For NAIDOC Week 2023, High Commissioner Sonya Koppe hosted an event to celebrate and

share Australian Indigenous art and cuisine, with the diplomatic corps, members of the public and private sectors, academia and, international agencies. We were honoured to have Chief Ricardo Bharath Hernandez and Ms Superville of the Santa Rosa First Peoples Community of Trinidad and Tobago in attendance. Ms Koppe presented a mini-exhibition of vibrant Indigenous artwork on loan to the High Commission through Australia's ArtBank, encompassing five pieces by Julie Dowling, an Indigenous artist from Perth. Her work explores issues of race and Aboriginal identity in contemporary Australia and specifically considers the continuing impacts of the Stolen Generations. Guests were also treated to a taste of Australia's native ingredients, sourced through Warndu, an Australian Aboriginal-owned business that employs Aboriginal people.

GIRLS PLAY AUSTRALIA

In celebration of the FIFA Women's World Cup, co-hosted by Australia and New Zealand in July and August 2023, the Australian High Commission and the Trinidad and Tobago Football Association (TTFA) teamed up for the Girls Play Australia football camp on 3 August 2023. Held at the Woodbrook Youth Facility, girls between ages six and twelve, alongside the TTFA under-17 women's football team. had the opportunity to showcase their talent and learn new skills, while engaging with young female athletes from Australia's Commonwealth Youth Games (CYG) team. Seventeen-time paralympic champion, Australian CYG Team General Manager and FIFA Ambassador Ellie Cole gave a keynote address and filmed a message of support from participants for Australia's Matildas football team.

Between 2022-2032, Australia will host several major sporting events in the lead up to the Brisbane Summer Olympics and Paralympic Games 2032. Dubbed the Green and Gold decade, it commenced in 2022 with the FIBA's Women's Basketball World Cup and Men's T20 Cricket World Cup and will include the Netball World Cup, the BMX World Championships, the ICC Men's T20 World Cup and the Men and Women's Ruqby World Cup.

TRINBAGO 2023 \\\

The Trinbago Commonwealth Youth Games, held between 4-11 August 2023, saw over 1000 athletes and para-athletes between ages 14-18 participate in seven sports.

Australia was represented by 51 female and 24 male athletes, including five First Nations Australians, from all of our states and territories. Together they topped the medal tally, winning 26 gold, 17 silver and 21 bronze.

Team General Manager, Ellie Cole OAM extended sincere gratitude on behalf of her team for the warm welcome and generous support shown to the Australian team at the Games in Trinidad and Tobago.

Congratulations to all medallists and to all the athletes, who gave their best to represent their nations and territories – 71 in total!
